COTTAGE MEETINGS LEARNINGS

Thank you to the over 75 parishioners who participated in St. Matthew's Cottage meetings this summer!

The Cottage meetings were offered as part of the discernment phase of our long-range planning process. We held 12 cottage meetings spread through out the months of July, August, and September at varying times to get a chance to talk with the congregation in small, manageable groups about the challenges and opportunities that we're facing as a congregation now and to think together about ideas of how to respond to these.

So many great conversations took place. Written notes were taken during these meetings and distributed to our committee. (If anyone wants to see those, please let us know!) On September 21st (St. Matthew's actual saint day!), members of the long-range planning committee sat down and synthesized the information we'd gathered over these past few months and came up with a list of priorities (in order) that we gleaned from both our own previous discussion and also by listening to the parish.

PHYSICAL SPACE CONCERNS:

1. Classrooms & meeting space

- The current space deficiencies of the Sunday School affect more than just those in Sunday School
- This was listed as a top priority.

2. Bathrooms

- One bathroom for each gender is not adequate for a church of our size

3. Office Space

- We heard clearly the desire to expand clergy and staff office space

4. Sanctuary / Worship Space

- Some services are over-crowded; some are not.
- There was an interest looking at re-configuring the space we currently have before we consider bumping out walls of the sanctuary. (e.g. swapping out chairs for more stable seating)

THEMES / CONCERNS:

- **Accessibility:** There was wide-spread desire that all places at St. Matthew's be as accessible to all as possible. (*vis a vis*: mobility limitations, hearing loss, etc.)
- **Rectory:** Many people mentioned using the rectory for additional office/classroom/meeting space.
- **Do this well:** We heard loud and clear that the projects we undertake should be done *well* (not always cheap)
- **Don't go too big:** People cautioned against going "too big" with physical improvements.
- **Current Debt:** St. Matthew's still carries debt from our last capital campaign and its projects. We will need to address that as we move forward.

REFLECTIONS:

It was surprising to me (and to some on our committee) that the need for worship space wasn't a higher priority – but this is why we had cottage meetings – to check our assumptions! Perhaps it's because only our 10:15 and large special services (holidays, baptisms, weddings, funerals) are crowded. Or perhaps it's because summer has a lighter attendance, so none of us were feeling too cramped then. But, as a committee we are going to keep listening throughout this process to make sure we are still on point with the needs and desires of the whole congregation.

The population of our long-range planning team may shift over time. Some people may need to step aside when life gets in the way. We may call some others on the committee when we need specific gifts and skills. This is one of those instances where it certainly takes a village!

NEXT STEPS:

Our decision point is to choose an architect to work with: to get an architectural plan and a price tag for how much these projects will cost.

In the next few weeks we'll be contacting architects, giving them a sense of our realities here, and asking them to make presentations to us with concrete plans to address our space issues.

Then, we'll come up with a final list of projects for the capital campaign and their associated costs. We'll then move into a feasibility/study phase to prepare for a capital campaign.

All the while listening, meeting, praying, communicating, and then listening and praying some more!

Please know that your feedback, ideas, and concerns are invited and welcome at any time.

STEWARDSHIP

The leaves are being to fall as the season changes. It is a time when I look back what I have planted this past spring and fall; harvest those last tomatoes in my vegetable garden, and begin to prepare my flower gardens for the coming year. It is a time to look back to see what has worked and how things might be changed to improve and perhaps add to those gardens in the coming next year.

As we reflect back over the past year, I hope you will look back to see how God has worked in the life of our parish and in your own life. I also hope you envision how our parish's mission might grow in the coming year.

One of the purposes for an annual stewardship campaign is to "help members of a faith community explore intentional and proportional giving as a spiritual practice that reflects gratitude and generosity for all that has been given."

Each of the commissions has been asked to submit three budget requests: a Bare Bones budget, a Wish List budget, and a Pie in the Sky budget for their commission. Once all of the requests are compiled the finance commission presents the three budget requests to the vestry.

Then, we'll come to the congregation and ask for a pledge from them for their financial contributions for 2012. It's important for the vestry to know these numbers as best we can ahead of time, so that we can plan how much to spend. While it's nice to get "surprise gifts" here and there, it's important for us, as good stewards of the church's resources, to be able to plan as accurately as possible.

A pledge letter will be going out at the end of October asking for your pledge of financial support. You can turn that in at any time, but we do ask for it on or before November 13th, so that we can start tweaking our 2012 budget to match our financial realities. We'll have a special time for collecting pledges on Sunday, November 13th, but you can turn it in early if you'd like.

As you reflect back on the past year and look toward the new year, we ask that you give from your gratitude to supporting St Matthew's ministry and outreach goals being mindful that we are not giving until it hurts, but we are giving until it feels good.

UPDATE ON ST. THOMAS’ PROPERTY

St. Thomas’ property has been on the market for almost a year now. One offer fell through this spring (due to a lack of support for a necessary zoning change). There have been no viable offers since. Bellwood Baptist Church has been renting the church for almost a year, but their new church will be finished this winter, and they will leave. St. Thomas’ vestry is still in tact and functioning as custodians of this property, but they feel like they have reached the end of the road there. The funds that St. Thomas’ still has will be insufficient to keep up the property for much longer. St. Matthew’s is not in a position to be able to assume the property and care for it. So, the vestry of St. Thomas’ voted to turn the property over to the diocese. The diocesan board will be in charge of maintaining the property until it is sold. If there are any proceeds from the sale of the property, after the maintenance expenses have been paid, the diocesan board has decided to give the left-over funds to St. Matthew’s.

We continue to give thanks for all of the wonderful ministry and memories that took place at St. Thomas’. We give thanks for all of those who gave so generously to build that structure and keep it up. And we’re grateful to be called together in ministry.

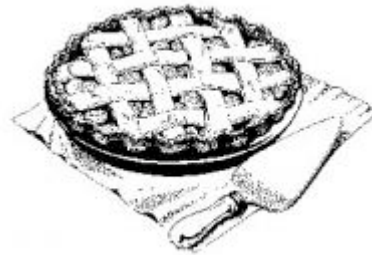
PIE FEST!

The military courtesy room opened July 29, 2008 and was established for the use and relaxation of all active and reserve military personnel traveling through the Central New York area. Our military often have to spend long hours waiting for their flights, sometimes overnight, when heading home on leave, moving to a new duty station or returning to their place of deployment. As part of St. Matthew's Outreach Commission, Lisa Sager is heading a project to help provide donated items to the courtesy room that the service men and women can use while waiting for their flights. 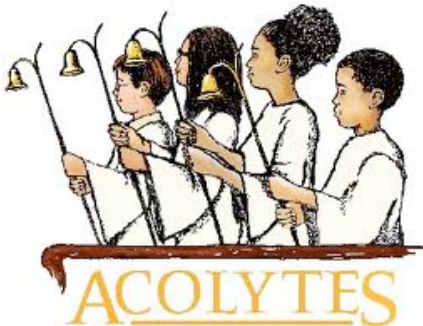

Craig has been trained as a Stewardship Mentor and Consultant by the National Episcopal Church and has been actively teaching and leading stewardship ministries since 2002. He has served as a Warden, Stewardship Committee Chairperson and church musician.

Craig serves as the Director of Development for the Berkshire Theatre Group. He is responsible for all fundraising activities including budgeting, grant writing, event planning, legacy giving, major gift solicitations, annual appeals and capital campaigns. He resides in Pittsfield, Mass. with his wife Virginia and three school-aged daughters.



The ministry of acolytes is one of assisting those who perform the liturgies of the Church. Acolytes assist the bishops, priests, deacons and other lay ministers conducting a liturgy by acting like good waiters in a restaurant, nurses in a surgery or attendants in a cloakroom. They assist the congregation by acting as examples of when to do what in the service. Their ministry is always marked by servanthood and is thus an authentic ministry of Christ.

There is historical evidence of this office in the 3rd century in both Rome and Carthage. For many centuries, the office was one of the four minor orders (along with porter, lector, and exorcist) in the Roman Catholic Church. In the Eastern Church, they were subsumed by the subdiaconate.

Liturgical purists suggest that the designation “acolyte” be restricted to the function of lighting, carrying and extinguishing candles, but the term is derived from a Latin word which means “follower” and is not sensibly so limited. The alternate term “server” is often used to describe persons who help with candles, carry a cross (crucifer) or an incenser (thurifer), or assist in other ways. The Roman term “altar boy” is no longer appropriate to Roman or Anglican Churches, with the admission of females to these ministries.

In typically Anglican fashion, the *American Book of Common Prayer* never mentions the word “acolyte” or “server.” The rubrics for the Holy Eucharist do urge that the principal celebrant “be assisted by other priests, and by deacons and lay persons” (BCP pp. 322, 354). Acolytes are among those lay persons.

Individual acolytes and guilds within parishes often belong to the Order of Saint Vincent, a worldwide organization of people in lay liturgical ministries which promotes a sacramentally-based rule of life, intercessory prayer and the study of liturgics.

The English liturgist Percy Dearmer counseled that acolytes should “avoid all fuss and needless running about.” For a fuller treatment of their roles, see *You Are an Acolyte* (Forward Movement Publications).
